Meanwhile, Krashen's Input Hypothesis suggests that learners acquire language effectively when they encounter comprehensible input slightly above their current level (i + 1) [2; 21-p.].

Several studies indicate that authentic materials boost learner motivation. When students listen to real-life content—such as songs, movies, interviews, and online videos—they engage more actively with the target language. Sherman points out that video-based authentic materials improve attention, cultural awareness, and recall [5; 39–40-p.].
