There is growing evidence of what linguists term "linguistic accommodation," where non-native English speakers adapt not only their language but also their communication styles and cultural expressions to align with English-speaking norms [8]. This view posits that English now functions as a practical medium rather than a carrier of specific cultural values.

The push for English-medium instruction in higher education institutions worldwide has created new opportunities for international academic collaboration but also raised concerns about the quality of education and the preservation of local academic traditions [7].
